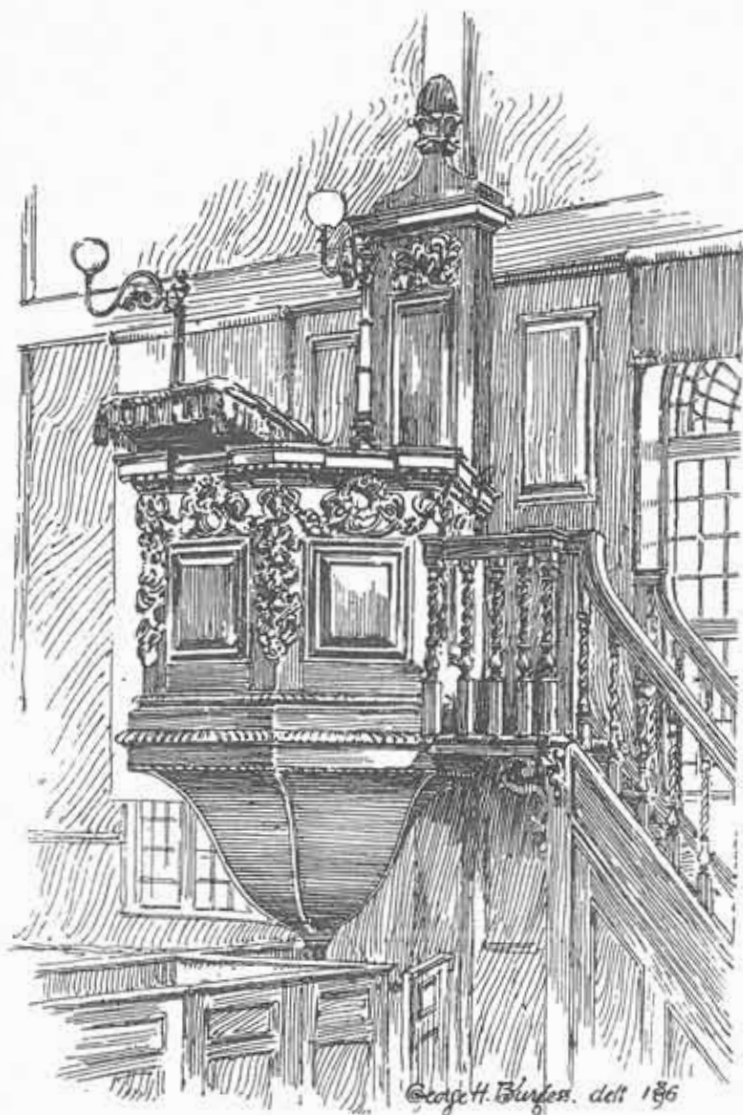

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NOTE BY THE AUTHOR.

THE Author believes this book to be unique, so far as the churches with which it deals are concerned. To the historical student it will be of value in giving him the main facts in the life of a congregation, from which he may possibly be able to build up its full and ample story; whilst to the general reader it will be useful in answering that oft-asked question:—“*Where can we find something about our congregation?*”

For ten years the Author has been collecting and verifying the details; he has tried to do his best, but it is only to be expected that where some hundreds of names and dates are concerned, errors have crept in, and have not been discovered.

Being himself a student, and deeply interested in the varied stories of the churches noted in these pages, he has long felt the want of such a volume of reference, and will feel amply repaid if his researches should prove of value to others.

He has personally visited over 200 of the churches, and has inspected more than 500 separate pieces of the Sacramental plate, and other antiquities mentioned in these pages.

The Author would be wanting in courtesy and in gratitude, did he not here heartily thank every one of his correspondents, clerical and lay, who have responded so willingly to his questions and enquiries. Where so very

many persons have helped it is impossible to thank all; he knows no one will be offended if, as representatives of especial departments of assistance, he only here thanks by name:—

The Rev. JAMES MARTINEAU, D.D., who in addition to many points of detail, so largely solved the knotty question of title, by suggesting one which should best describe the varied contents of the book, and who, in one of his letters to the author, says:—“*I heartily wish, though I cannot sanguinely hope, that your valuable historical labours may check the tendency of our fellow-worshipping people to lose sight of the fundamental anti-dogmatic principle of their forefathers. The protesters against the abuse of the name ‘Unitarian’ are, I fear, a small minority; the great mass of our congregations being as much wedded to their type of ‘orthodoxy’ as the professors of the Westminster Confession of Faith to their ampler formulary. Under present circumstances the question of title is difficult. On looking over your table of contents, I fancied that the whole would be covered, and not more than covered, by such a phrase as ‘Documents and Vestiges of Early Nonconformity of’ (proper descriptions of the geographical range). If this phrase seems to promise too much, as if a view were offered of the whole of the local Nonconformity, it might be limited by saying ‘Some Documents and Vestiges.’*

The term ‘Anti-trinitarian’ is, I think, still more misleading than ‘Unitarian’ as applied to the old congregations legalised under the Toleration Act.”

INTRODUCTION.

It will be noticed that the accounts of every church (arranged in alphabetical order of places) are divided into five portions:—

- (a). *Dates of congregations being founded and buildings erected.*
- (b). *List of ministers and their years of office.*
- (c). *Plate and other treasures.*
- (d). *Registers.*
- (e). *Topography.*

This arrangement has been adopted because it seemed the one which should best serve the purpose of giving such particulars as are of primary necessity in any enquiry respecting the history of a church. Generally speaking, it may be said that the particulars have been gathered into this small compass from the most trustworthy, and, in many cases, original sources. Documents, deeds, early treasurers' accounts, minute books, and registers, have been made to yield their harvests.

It is a regrettable fact, but one which has to be faced, that so many congregations seem to take little or no interest in their archives and muniments,—minute books, when finished, instead of being promptly deposited in the vestry safe (how few vestries have one!) generally remain in the secretary's private possession, with the inevitable result that, after his death, or his ceasing to hold office, they disappear, and in course of time are entirely lost. Far more attention is paid to the care of the congregation's coals, or its crockery, than to its valuable MSS. and other records of the past. Cases could be cited, within the author's per-

sonal knowledge, where papers of great historical interest were seen in one of the church libraries, and consulted so late as 1872, but which were lost in 1886; of an eighteenth century minute book being used to prop up a lame table; of a preaching diary or vestry register, containing more than forty autographs of different ministers, being found in the waste paper hole, ready for the next fire-kindling; to say nothing of that process known as "clearing out the rubbish," which "rubbish," before now, has included a memorial brass; rare old, but dusty volumes from the church library; and time-yellowed papers from the vestry table drawer. With these forces continually at work, the wonder is not that we have lost so little, but that, fortunately, so much remains.

On the other hand, some churches now exercise the greatest care in the custody of their archives. In one case, a series of well-kept minute books, unbroken from 1810, with MSS. of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, are safely housed under the immediate control of responsible officials; in another old congregation every deed and minute book has, for years past, been handed on from minister to minister; whilst, in yet another church, a list of the manuscript books and other archives is kept in the vestry, with a note stating where they are to be consulted. By degrees, congregations will awake to a sense of their responsibility in these matters, and take more care of their records.

(a). DATES OF CONGREGATIONS BEING FOUNDED AND BUILDINGS ERECTED.

One word of warning seems necessary under this heading. The date of the beginning or founding of a congregation is one thing—often very hard to be exactly stated—and widely different from that of the date of the building; but frequently we find the two confounded. Too great care

in this matter cannot be exercised by the historian who desires to give an accurate account of the congregation about which he writes. Every likely source should be explored if the work is to be of real benefit; deeds should be hunted up, and carefully read; the building, if an old one, should be thoroughly examined for any dates which may be on the walls, the water spouts, the bell, the rafters, the pews, and the inscriptions on the earliest gravestones should be deciphered as correctly as possible; in fact, nothing must be neglected as too insignificant, and nothing must be taken on hearsay only.

Attention should always be turned to the reliable MS. volumes by Walter Wilson, stored in Dr. Williams's Library, Gordon Square, and to the early registers of the congregation, which will probably be found in Somerset House, Strand. Not infrequently, an historical account of the greatest value will be found in the baptismal or burial register, carefully and lovingly written there by some former minister who had access to sources now closed.

(b). LISTS OF MINISTERS AND THEIR YEARS OF OFFICE.

Here, again, we come to a fruitful source of error, especially in particulars of the earlier ministers. From a fairly long experience, the author thinks there is nothing more difficult, of its kind, than precisely to locate and time some of the ministers from 1662 to 1710. Care should always be taken to distinguish between minister and assistant; and, above all, never to assume, without some authority, that the successor must of necessity have been appointed immediately his predecessor died, or ceased in his office as minister. In these pages more than ordinary care has been taken in this matter, but the author feels sure there must still be cases of inaccuracy, and he will feel obliged to anyone who will direct his attention to them.

In hunting for particulars of a minister, and with little or no data to guide him, the historian cannot do better than first try to get the date of death. With this in his possession, he most frequently has the key which will unlock the treasure-house. Some biography or obituary will probably be found in local or denominational periodicals about the time of death, or included in any funeral sermon which may have been printed.

For particulars of the ejected men of 1662, there is Calamy's Account, 1713, and Continuation, 1727, abridged in Palmer's *Nonconformist's Memorial*, first edition, 1775; second edition, 1802-3. Attention should be given to "Evans's List," as it is popularly known, being *Lists of Presbyterian, Independent and Baptist Congregations in England*, prepared for Dr. John Evans, 1714-29, and now stored in Dr. Williams's Library. A printed version of this, more or less inaccurate, is given in *The History of the Litigation and Legislation Respecting Presbyterian Chapels and Charities in England and Wales between 1816 and 1849*, by T. S. James (1867). The *Record of Unitarian Worthies* (1877), the *Record of the Provincial Assembly of Lancashire and Cheshire* (1896), and the *Dictionary of National Biography*, now approaching completion, and to be found in most public libraries, will all be of use to the historian.

Unless where much searching has failed to discover them, the Christian name or names of all ministers should always be printed in full. By not adopting this course, endless confusion has been and still is being caused between contemporary men having the same initials.

(c). PLATE AND OTHER TREASURES.

In describing the plate, the term *chalice* is used for a vessel with two handles and a foot. All the primitive chalices have handles, the definition of *calix* being a cup

with two handles and a foot. The cup without handles seems to have been originally a secular vessel, but came into sacred use at the time of the withdrawal of the cup from the laity.

The various styles of chalices, cups, beakers, and pots will be found in the illustrations.

So far as the author is aware, there are no golden vessels in the possession of any of the churches—only those of silver, pewter, and plated metal.

Amongst the oldest pieces are one of the cups (1576-77) at George's Meeting, Exeter; one of the beakers (1631-32?) at Great Meeting, Yarmouth; and the peculiar chalice (1641-42) at Platt Chapel, Manchester.

Many and varied have been the author's experiences in hunting up particulars of plate and other treasures. He has walked some hundreds of miles, touring about amongst the churches in the United Kingdom. The storehouses in which he has seen the plate range from bankers' and jewellers' vaults in the bowels of the earth to the modest bandbox under the caretaker's bed; from *under* the Communion table, when not *on* it, to an unprotected wash-house; from the coalhole, under the gravedigger's tools, to the safe in a grocer's shop.

In the matter of defunct congregations and closed churches, some of their plate has fortunately found its way into the safe custody of Dr. Williams's Library; and in one notable case, that of Warminster, into the hands of the British and Foreign Unitarian Association; but much is lost, or now in private hands. Not without thought the author ventures to suggest that plate, and other articles of historical interest once owned by these dead congregations, should be deposited either with the trustees of Dr. Williams's Library, London, or Manchester College, Oxford. What really does become of such plate? It

generally passes into the keeping of the last or senior trustee. In time he dies. What then? Disappearance, loss, and—probably through want of knowledge by executors or survivors—*sale*, and ultimate appearance as a sugar bason on some lady's tea table. The author knows of four sets of plate, formerly owned by as many defunct congregations, which are now in the keeping of private individuals. One of the sets consists of two silver beakers, made and assayed between 1691 and 1698.

Not infrequently, the inscription on some article of the plate gives us the name by which the place of worship was known in the last century, or earlier. Blackley is a case in point. Here the two fine pewter patens are engraved with the words, "Blackley Dissenters' Chapel, 1791;" to-day we read an illustrated article on "Blackley Unitarian Chapel!!" *O tempora! O mores!*

It is the author's dearest wish that, should any attention be drawn by this book to the valuable plate and other treasures owned by the churches, it will result in greater care being taken of them, and more interest centred upon them in the future.

(d). REGISTERS.

Under this heading the author has given particulars of the non-parochial registers formerly in the possession of the churches, and now in the custody of the Superintendent Registrar at Somerset House, Strand.

On 13 September, 1836, Commissioners were appointed to enquire into the state, custody, and authenticity of non-parochial registers. Letters of enquiry were sent to the various churches in England and Wales requesting information, and suggesting the transfer of the records to Somerset House on the plea of safe custody and facility of access. This request was optional, and some congrega-

tions (Gorton, Stourbridge, etc., *e.g.*) declined to part with their registers, whilst other congregations secured certified copies before allowing the originals to go to London. Down to 1889, access free of charge was enjoyed by properly accredited persons to search and make extracts from these records for historical and literary purposes. In that year the Registrar-General refused free access, on the ground of want of necessary accommodation for applicants. The matter was promptly brought before the House of Commons, and Government was asked by Mr. J. Carvell Williams, M.P., to make representations to the Registrar-General to restore the facilities enjoyed for many years. On 30 May, 1895, it was announced in Parliament that "the Registrar-General has made arrangements for the accommodation of any gentleman whose application is backed by an introduction by any M.P. or other well-known person, and who wishes to consult, for literary and historical purposes, the Non-parochial Registers and Records which are deposited at Somerset House. No fees will be charged for searching the registers by persons duly accredited." Since that date, every facility has been granted.

The particulars given as to the dates of the registers, etc., are taken from a copy of a Blue Book of 1841, in the author's possession.

(*e*). TOPOGRAPHY.

Full particulars of the authorities consulted will be found in the List of Contractions; whilst works and histories peculiar to the church under consideration will be found in the Topography. With one or two exceptions, the author has in his library all the histories and monographs mentioned.

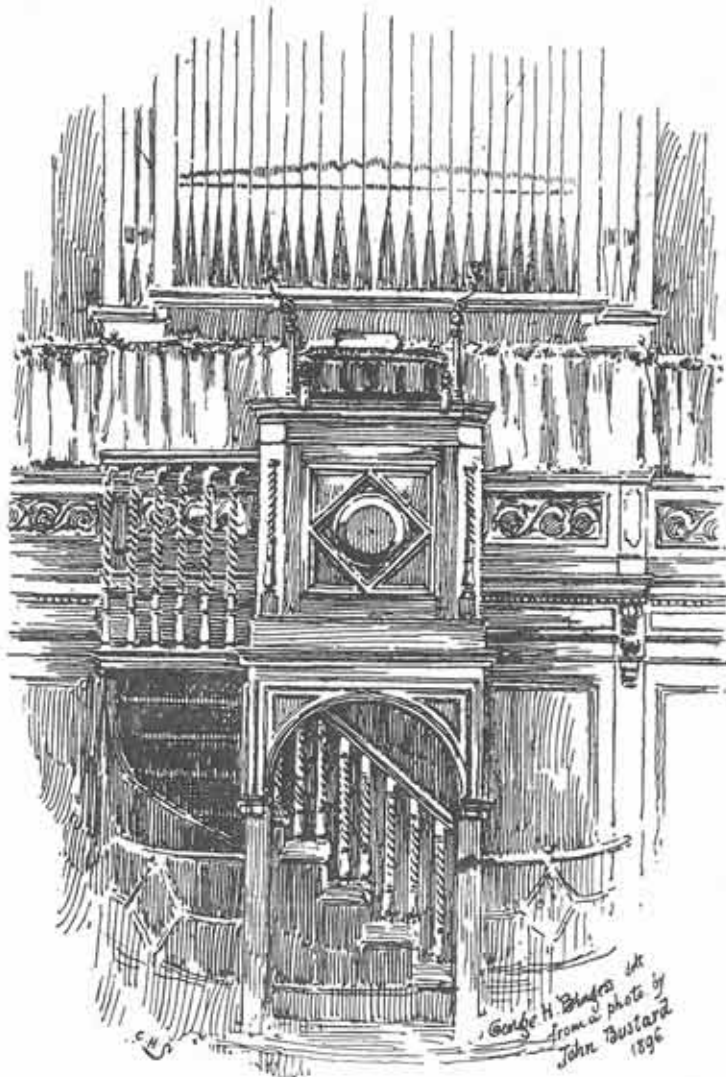

NOTE.—In the Library belonging to this Congregation is a thin, small quarto MS. vol. containing the minutes of 8 meetings of the Warrington Class, viz., one at Ashton, 31 May, 1722; one at Gateacre, 17 March, 1719/20; four at Liverpool, 22 April, 1719; 9 Aug., 1721; 20 Sept., 1721; 8 Nov., 1721; and two at St. Helens, 6 Aug., 1719, and 1 Feb., 1721/22.

This inscription is written on front page:—

"This book appertains to the Warrington Class, being bought by the Ministers thereof 1719."

It was originally bound in vellum, and so continued till 1872; between then and 1886 the cover was removed. In 1887 the leaves (uncut) were gathered together and bound in their present leather cover by G. K. E., who also made a line for line copy of the entries.

The meeting on 8 Nov., 1721, was "at Castle Hey Chappel, in Leverpool, beginning at Ten a clock," when "a Day of Humiliation" was "observed upon account of the plague," there being present Chas. Owen, moderator and preacher; Henry Roughley, John Kennion, Joseph Gellibrand, Christopher Basnett, Tetlaw, Aix: Wright, Jos. Lawton, —. Mather, and Henry Winder, *Scribe*.

Henry Winder's library, and some of his MSS. also belong to this Congregation. Amongst the remains now in the library are the MSS.: "*My last Sermon preached in ye old Chappel on Wednesday, June 28, 1727.*" 1 Peter iv. 8. ["And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover the multitude of sins"]; and "*An Account of ye Receipts and Disbursements of ye Sacram^t money at Castle Hey Chappel, 16 Nov., 1718, to 20 Dec., 1725.*"

Other MSS. in this Library include a bound volume of Rev. John Seddon's lectures, Warrington, 1767-70; and the folio of Octagon Chapel (*q. v.*) Papers, 1762, both being gifts of the late Mr. Henry Arthur Bright.

Amongst many rare printed volumes, *liber rarissimus*, is surely *New Testament; Gr. and Eng., containing the original text and a new version*, 2 vols., London, 8vo., 1729. It is anonymous, but by Daniel Mace (min. Newbury, 1726/27-1753), and is the first English attempt at a critical text, an odd version oddly printed.

Of this Congregation I was a member from 1 Jan., 1874 to 30 June, 1889; of its Sunday School a teacher from 4 Jan., 1874, to 27 Oct., 1877; and its superintendent from 4 Nov., 1877, to 30 June, 1889; of the Chapel Council a member from 29 Feb., 1880, to 30 June, 1889; and of the Library and Publication Committee a member from 13 March, 1881, to 30 June, 1889.—G. 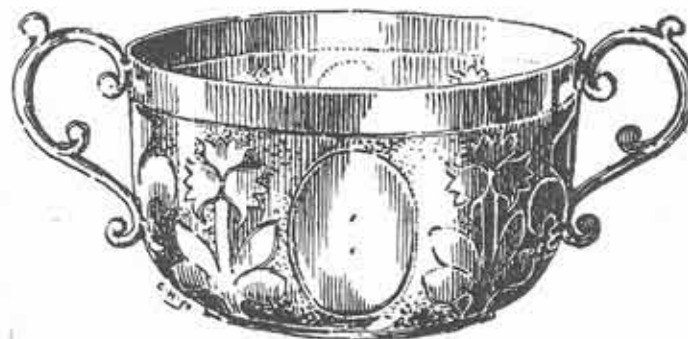

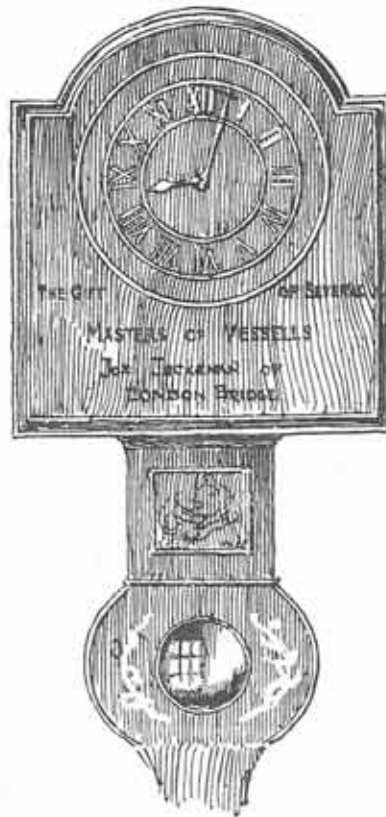

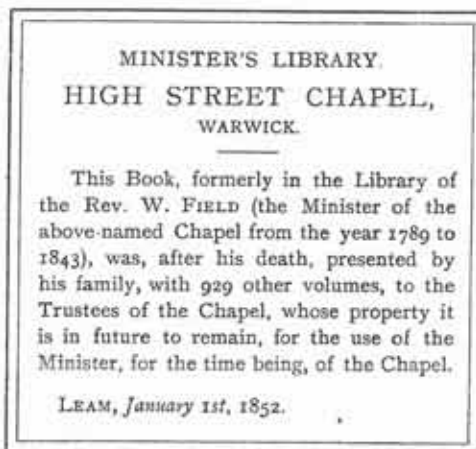

MEMORIAL BRASSES.

The 23 brasses—covering, in 41 lives, a period of 164 years, from Thomas Yate, born 1672, to Mrs. Benyon, died 1836—which were on the walls of this chapel, were carefully removed, and placed on the north and south walls of the Church of The

Saviour, Highgate, Whitchurch, of which I am minister, in 1894 and 1896. A full account of them will be found in the *Church Chronicle* (No. 35) for Feb., 1896, and in the *Transactions of the Monumental Brass Society*, No. 6, new series, Jan., 1897.

NOTE.—Regular worship ceased in this chapel in 1844. On 9 Dec., 1891, the building was sold by public auction—I being present—for £161, to Mr. John A. Roberts, who had for some time used it as his school-house. Proceeds were handed over to the British and Foreign School Society, by Mr. J. H. Warburton Lee, solicitor, of Broad Oak.—G. E. E.

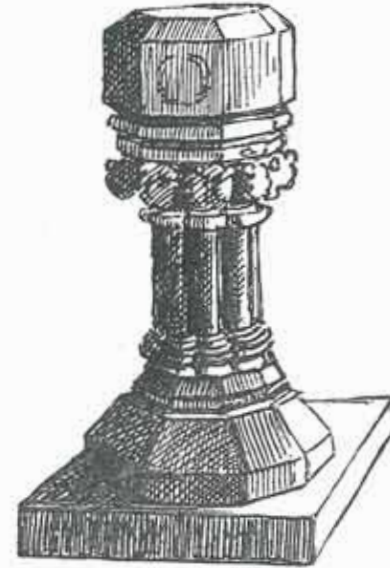

NOTE.—Edward Brice, M.A., is sometimes wrongly said to have been first nonconforming minister here. On 29 Dec., 1613, he was deposed at Glasgow. 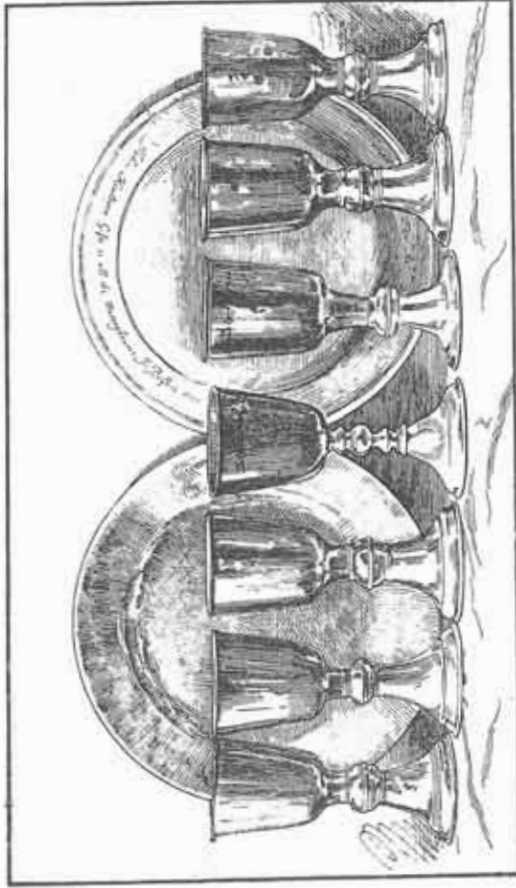

On p. 21 of *Historic Memorials* we read that "he would have preached a second time, but on the first occasion the crowd swarmed all over the building, and in the commotion some unconverted hearer managed to abstract the silver rim and clasp from the pulpit Bible, so the Trustees declined to grant their Meeting-house again to the great evangelist."

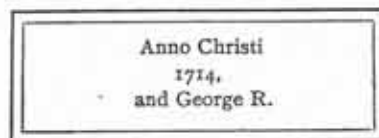

"Robert Cunningham is regarded as the founder of Presbyterianism in Holywood. He was inducted on November 9th, 1615, and was silenced on August 10th, 1636, for Nonconformity. In 1642 an Eldership was erected in Holywood, a minister being sent for that purpose from the Presbytery which had been formed at Carrickfergus on June 10th, 1642 (see *A True Narrative of the Rise and Progress of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland*, by the Rev. Patrick Adair, p. 96, Killen's edition). On 8th of April, 1644, the Covenant was administered at Holywood (see the original document preserved in the Museum of the Belfast Natural History Society). The Rev. George Wallace, a member of the Presbytery that met at Ballymena on April 8th, 1659, was settled at Holywood (see *A True Narrative, &c.*, by Adair; note to Killen's edition, p. 225). George Wallace conformed at the Restoration, and was admitted Vicar of Holywood on December 12th, 1661 (*ibid.*, p. 262). It was probably after this event that the union with Dundonald took place."

MEETINGS were held regularly twice a year, from 1693 onward, on the second Tuesday in May and August. In 1722 the latter meeting was postponed till September; it reverted to August in 1736; but from 1740 till the time when the records cease, the month of meeting (with one exception, 1741) was again September. Besides these ordinary meetings—which were held at Knutsford, with only four exceptions as to place, since 1692—occasional extraordinary meetings were held at other places, chiefly for the purpose of conferring ordination.

The Minute Book, formerly in the possession of Henry Green, M.A., and given by him to the trustees of Brook Street Chapel, Knutsford (*q.v.*), is kept with the utmost regularity and neatness from 1691 to 1745, and supplies no internal indication of the cause of its sudden cessation. Mr. Green's conjecture on the subject seems plausible. In 1746, William Turner, then minister of Allostock, near Knutsford, left from ill-health, and apparently took the minute book of the Ministers' Meeting with him, since it was through his descendants that it was restored to Cheshire, and given to Mr. Green.

THE union of the Provincial Meeting and the Cheshire Meeting took place in consequence of the institution of the Widows' Fund, which was projected in 1762 by the Provincial Meeting at Warrington. The Cheshire ministers were invited to join in its establishment, a proposal which they gladly accepted; and, in order to carry it out more completely, the Cheshire Meeting was discontinued, and the ministers of both counties met together at Warrington in June, 1765. There are no existing minute books of the Provincial Meeting till the year 1820, when its minutes were regularly kept, and when the Unitarian movement had assumed a distinct importance, and was already recognised in the official title of the Provincial Meeting. Nearly all we know of the history of the Provincial Meeting between 1765 and 1820 is due to the care of successive secretaries of the Widows' Fund, two of whom, however—Rev. Thomas Barnes, D.D., secretary 1783-1810, and Rev. William Johns, secretary 1814-1820, and subsequently—unfortunately, for our purpose, omit all distinct mention of the Provincial Meetings from their minutes. But between 1765 and 1782, and again in 1811 and 1812, we are furnished, not only with the names of the preachers, but apparently with a memorandum of every matter of importance.

A list of meeting places and of preachers since 1800 is to be found in the existing minute books of the Provincial Meeting. The portion of the following list, prior to 1800, is revised from the *Report* (1870), hereinafter mentioned.

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The title, "Provincial Assembly," now officially adopted, does not appear at all before 1842; but its adoption as a customary designation of the Meeting, though not yet authorised, is apparent in nearly all printed documents referring to the Meeting since the introduction (1856) of the "delegate" system. For further information on this subject the reader is referred to the *Report on the Laws and Usages of the Assembly*, compiled by the Special Committee, which was appointed on 14th October, 1869, to examine the minutes of the Assembly, and to draw up a statement of the laws and usages of the Assembly from the beginning, and to print and circulate the same. This report was revised, adopted, and ordered to be published on 13th January, 1870.

Immediately after the last minutes, but in a later handwriting, is this note:—

“*Mem.—No minutes appear to have been preserved from this time till May, 1733, for which, and the subsequent ones, see the Book marked No. 3.*”

It is probable that this mem., and those referring to the other minute books, referred to above, if we may judge by the writing, were made in the early part of this, the nineteenth century.

The above particulars are extracted from the original MS. minute book, a small quarto, largely in shorthand, which, since 1855, has been in the custody of Dr. Williams's Trustees, and is now in their library in Gordon Square. On the inner front cover is affixed a label with this inscription:—

This volume was in the possession of Bishop Trelawny, into whose hands I suspect it to have come from Mr. Bond, of Looe; who was an High Churchman, and obsequious servant of the Bishop, but whose near relative was an eminent Dissenting minister, whose name is on the inside of the cover of the volume. [“Bond, Sept. 5, 6, 1710.”—G. E. E.] I have seen a treatise on some religious subject by this Mr. Bond, in the possession of the late Thomas Bond, Esq^r. of Looe (author of an History of those Boroughs). It was in manuscript, and is now in the possession of Davies Gilbert, Esq^r. of Eastbourne. P.R.S.

There is also in the volume (loose) the interesting letter in which Mr. Couch hands the book to the trustees, by whose permission, at the hands of their librarian, Francis Henry Jones, B.A., I have had the volume on loan, and made copious extracts from it in my common-place book. I look upon this minute book as one of great value and importance, inasmuch as it proves, with the one noted below, the practice of requiring belief in the Trinity by the ministers during the period covered by the entries.

The next series of meetings is extracted from another original MS. minute book, which I had the good fortune to discover amongst the papers and books of the late James Taplin, one of my father's predecessors in the ministry of George's Meeting, Colyton (*q.v.*), Devon, into whose hands it came some time between 1834–1847. I found it in 1888, and deposited it with Dr. Williams's Trustees, who kindly gave me a line-for-line copy of it, in the handwriting of their librarian. At the end of the MS. is a memorandum

concerning two other books, making, with it, a set of three, and carrying the minutes back to September, 1721, and on to May, 1753. Where those other two books are I cannot say, but I am inclined to think that the late Jerom Murch must have seen them when writing the article on p. 548 of his *History of Presbyterian and General Baptist Churches in the West of England*, published in 1835. Possibly they may yet turn up; if so, the finder cannot do better than deposit them with their fellows. Whether such MSS. are public or private property is rather hard to say. The custom seems to have been for the scribe or clerk to keep the minutes as if they were his own, and in this way many minute books have been lost, either wholly or for a time.

Under date 7 and 8 May, 1728, there are the following entries in the minutes relating to the Assembly's care for certain Communion Vessels:—

“Agreed that Mr. Sloly be desir'd to deliver some pieces of silver plate he hath in his hands which he formerly us'd att the celebration of the Sacrament in Silverton. Mr. Sloly promis'd to comply wth the request of the Assembly, and to deliver the plate in the afternoon, he having a proper rec^t to Indemnify him.

“Mr. Sloly, according to his promise, bro^t the said pieces of plate to the Assembly, for which they gave him a rec^t in the following words, viz.:—May 8th, 1728. We, the Ministers of Devon now assembled, do hereby acknowledge y^t we have rec^d att the hands of the Rev^d Mr. John Sloly three pieces of silver plate (viz.), one silver plate mark'd in the brim $\overset{B}{W} \underset{E}$ 1691, and on the backside the weight, 20 „ 12; one silver beaker, mark'd only in the bottom as to its weight, 5 „ 18, and one silver bowl, mark'd in the side,

and with the weight in the bottom, 5 „ 10, being pieces of plate which he, the said Mr. Sloly, says he had us'd always

in the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper whilst he was minister of the Protestant Dissenting congregation at Silverton; for which pieces of plate, so rec^d by us, we promise to indemnify the said Mr. Sloly. Subscrib'd att the request and in the name of the ministers of Devon assembled on the above 8th of May by us—

JOHN LAVINGTON,
JOHN ENTY, *Scribe.*

“Agreed, that the Exeter ministers, upon advising wth some of the people of Silverton about the said, may deliver it if they think fit to Mrs. Elizabeth Gold, shee giving a proper rec^t for the same to indemnify the Assembly.”

SOME ACCOUNT
OF THE
DUDLEY DOUBLE LECTURE.
1723-1865.

The late James Scott, Minister, Park Lane Chapel, Cradley (*q. v.*), 1789-1827, says, in his MS. history of that society, "The Rev. J. Willets preached in the house of Mr. Jos. Smith, situated on the turnpike road leading to Wolverhampton [from Dudley]. Here a regular society was formed; and the ejected ministers in the neighbourhood agreed to preach a double lecture on Whitsun Tuesday, which, after the removal of the society to the Chapel in Dudley, has been ever since continued there."

In the original minute book (now in keeping of the secretary for the time being of the Monthly Meeting of Protestant Dissenting Ministers of Warwickshire and neighbouring Counties, established 1782) there is this note on p. 4:—"I find that the Dudley Double Lecture took place immediately after, and in consequence of, the Act of Conformity being passed, *i. e.*, 1662. That it was established by the ejected ministers of Dudley [no minister was ejected from Dudley] and the neighbourhood in commemoration of that event, and with the view of maintaining and extending the principles of dissent. We have no account of minutes before 1723, but I have ascertained the following—1723, 1758, 1769, 1770, 1773."—J [ohn] P [almer].

“ That ye Persons who preach shall have ye Nomination of the Preachers for the year following.

“ That ye Senior of the Preachers shall pray the year following, unless absent, in w^{ch} case ye other shall perform ye same duty.

“ That every Minister attending ye Lecture produce a Sermon at the Minister's house a quarter before eleven o'clock, and that he be censured in case he do not, by the Senior Preacher.

“ That in case either of ye appointed Preachers be absent, he who has not preached for ye longest time sh^l take his turn. This rule to apply, if both Preachers of the last year be absent, to the devotional Service.

“ That these rules be read over by the Ministers of ye place at every Lecture.

“ It is ye wish of us here present that these rules be read over and adopted at Oldbury.”

In 1866, the double lecture was discontinued, and Dudley was included as one of the regular places of the Monthly Meeting.

1776-1865.

Concerning this lecture, Job Orton says (27 June, 1775):—"I wondered very much when I was a child that no more notice was taken of Bartholomew's Day by the dissenters, as I had heard so much of it from my grandfather and others, pious relations and aged Christians. Oldbury lecture in this neighbourhood used to be preached in the week in which the 24th of August fell, and was instituted on purpose to commemorate these eminent men. I once preached there, and considered their case. But on account of the harvest it was put off to the middle of September [second Tuesday in September], which I think was wrong, as the object of the lecture was in time forgotten. I persuaded some ministers whom I could be free with, when they preached this lecture, to keep in view the intention of it, and they did so, much to the pleasure and edification of their hearers."

In his MS. history of Park Lane Chapel, Cradley (*q. v.*), James Scott says:—"Oldbury lecture has existed more than a century. Tradition reports that a stack of chimnies fell down at the Brades House, by which the Turton family were in imminent danger. To express their gratitude for this deliverance they invited the neighbouring ministers to assist them in keeping a day of thanksgiving; who from that time annually assembled in the Dissenting Chapel in Oldbury. I have since learnt, from undoubted authority, that it was instituted to commemorate the ministers ejected on Bartholomew's Day, 1662."

David Maginnis, F.R.Hist.S., minister at Stourbridge (*q. v.*) 1862-1884, in his "Historical Sketch," read at the

Centenary Celebration of the Monthly Meeting of Protestant Dissenting Ministers of Warwickshire and the neighbouring Counties, held in Birmingham, 13 December, 1882, says:—"A traditional account attributes the origin of the Oldbury Lecture to the following incident—The Turton family, who resided at the Brades, narrowly escaped serious injury from the falling of a part of their house, and they invited the neighbouring ministers to assist them in keeping a Day of Thanksgiving, and it has been stated that the ministers from that time annually assembled in the Oldbury Dissenting Chapel. The fact seems to be that the Oldbury Lecture, though not coeval with the Dudley Lecture, was founded for the same object by successors of the ejected ministers, and that the Brades accident occurring about the same time as one of the Oldbury Lectures was naturally made a prominent subject of thanksgiving by the brethren, the Turtons being an influential and much respected family, with whom the eminent minister of that name, of Birmingham and Oldbury, was closely connected."

The earliest reliable record of this lecture is the minute book, which begins in 1776.

In 1865 the double lecture was discontinued, and Oldbury was included as one of the regular places of the Monthly Meeting.

SOME ACCOUNT OF THE
MONTHLY MEETING
OF
PROTESTANT DISSENTING MINISTERS
OF WARWICKSHIRE
AND THE NEIGHBOURING COUNTIES,
1782-1897.

"The Monthly Meeting of Protestant Dissenting Ministers of Warwickshire and the neighbouring Counties" was formed in the year 1782. The records of the earlier years of its existence are very scanty of information. It is considered probable that the meetings grew out of private meetings of three ministers, viz., Samuel Clark, a minister (1756-1769) of the Old Meeting, Birmingham; Thomas Robins, Minister (1761-1776) of West Bromwich; and John Cole, Minister (1759-1781) of Wolverhampton, who met once a month at each other's houses for instructive conversation on literary and religious subjects, but without any public service, and they continued to meet till Mr. Clark's death in 1769. Mr. Robins afterwards removed to Daventry, and in 1775 succeeded Dr. Ashworth as principal of the Dissenting Academy of that place.

The first of the monthly Meetings was held at West Bromwich on 7 May, 1782, "at Rev. Mr. [Samuel] Bra-brook's house," when several ministers assembled, and agreed to enter into the following resolutions:—

"That we will meet together monthly for the purpose of mutual instruction and edification. . . . for public prayer and preaching in the morning at each other's places respectively. That in the afternoon we will more privately discuss some question of importance which was proposed the preceding meeting. That, in a book to be kept by W. Procter, minutes of each day's proceedings shall be entered."

Thanks to the care of the successive secretaries—William Procter, Alexander Paterson, William Bowen, Samuel Bache, John Gordon, David Maginnis, F.R.Hist.S., Charles Clarke, Samuel Fletcher Williams, Henry M'Kean, Arthur Ellis O'Connor, B.D., and Evan David Priestley Evans—minutes of every meeting have been kept, and the valuable series of minute books is in the custody of the secretary for the time being.

This was an Arian fraternity, and discussed topics from the very first; it must not be mixed with the much older and now extinct Double Lectures at Dudley and Oldbury.

The Centenary of the Monthly Meeting was celebrated on 13 December, 1882, at Birmingham, when an historical sketch was read at the morning meeting, in the lecture-room of the Church of the Messiah, by David Maginnis, F.R.Hist.S., followed by a public dinner under the presidency of Dr. Russell, J.P., and divine service in the evening in the Church of the Messiah, conducted by John Robberds, B.A., with sermon from S. Matt. xiii, 33, by Joseph Estlin Carpenter, M.A., of Manchester New College, London. The sketch, speeches and sermon were afterwards printed and circulated.

The following suggestions, respecting the meetings, revised and completed by the Sub-Committee, which met on Monday, May 28th, for that purpose, were finally adopted at the Ministers' Meeting at West Bromwich, on Wednesday, June 6th, 1894 :—

1.—That in addition to the conduct of the formal business—

- (a) Papers may be read on any subject connected with Religious Life and Thought ;
- (b) Services may be held at which a Sermon may be delivered ;
- (c) Topics of Public interest, or of immediate urgency may be considered ; and any resolutions NOT of a party or sectarian character may be adopted.

2.—That the meetings shall commence with prayer.

3.—That at least once a year the Ministers shall be invited to bring their wives, so that they shall share in the social and intellectual proceedings of the meeting.

4.—That one of the meetings of the year be set apart for devotional purposes only, and that where it may be desired by those giving the invitation, the Communion Service may also be held in connection with the meeting.

5.—That, wherever practicable, an Evening Meeting of a public character shall be held.
